


Numbers 1-5 are statements of fact.


Number 6 is a trick question that reflects our public misinformation (see comments at that item).

 Human nervous impulses travel as electrical signals along our nerves and use chemicals, like a-cetyl-cholin-ester-ase, to bridge gaps between nerves.



ASTROCYTE

A nerve signal zooms down a long axon then it jumps across a synaptic gap to a dendrite on another nerve. An electric zap and neurotransmitters boost the signal across the gap (see closeup). Astrocytes bring nutrients to nerves and regulate the action at synapses. Oligodendrocytes produce insulation to surround axons. A mass of nerve cells in the brain looks like the tangled roots of a desectorest.






- Trees have feeling. It's nice to help them feel better if you can. Kissing them is good.

- A tree can also hold your heart so you don't get hurt.







11. Your age group


